The Lowell Police Department is excited to notify you of two state grant awards recently received from the Department of Mental Health. The first is a Jail/Arrest Diversion Program award in the amount of \$15,000. This funding will enable the LPD to backfill shifts while other officers attend Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training in FY 2024.

The second is a Jail/Arrest Diversion Program award in the amount of \$74,726. This funding will enable the LPD to support two full-time co-response clinicians in FY 2024. The clinicians will be essential to assisting individuals experiencing a crisis and diverting them from the criminal justice system.
